Kissore Samad, 12, is sick. He has had a strong fever for 2 days. A surveillance worker who is visiting him is pretty sure that he has malaria as he works 4 hours a day in a forest area around Rourkela in Orissa state, which is one of the Indian states most concerned by malaria. Later in the day, Kissore will attend a clinic where he will be diagnosed with malaria.

A violent rainstorm in Namentenga, Burkina Faso. As one of the first of the rainy season, it also announces the beginning of the malaria season since malaria mosquitoes need stagnant water to breed.

The emergency department at Gondama Hospital, in Bo, Sierra Leone, run by a team from the Belgian branch of Doctors Without Borders (MSF). Two unconscious children suffering from acute malaria await treatment. Practically half the patients in this hospital - almost all of them children under five years old - are being treated for malaria, which is by far the leading cause of mortality in Sierra Leone. Deaths linked with malaria accounted for 60 % of mortality at Gondama Hospital in April 2008. It is not unusual for children suffering from severe malaria to be diagnosed on arrival in hospital with poisoning from herbs prescribed by traditional healers.

Ginba Chawa is a 25 year old Karen living in Thailand. Her five children have all contracted malaria at least once and one of them has contracted it four times. According to a local malaria specialist, this is due to numerous reasons, such as the old bed net that has just been re-impregnated and is now drying on the wall behind her and the numerous water receptacles around her house. It is also due to the fact that the family is in contact with Karens from Burma, a highly infected region, who carry the parasite with them to Thailand.

Two Karen kids playing in the Moei river that is the Thai-Burma border. This place is considered by many specialists as the place where the malaria parasite is the strongest of the world. The river is, in some part, a breeding place for malaria mosquitoes. Northern Thailand.
