They are often caught in legal proceedings for helping migrants.

Water isn't easily found for the migrants. They need to find new supplying sources regularly and to bring it back to the camp.

After a night spent trying to smuggle in England, they come back around four or five am and sleep till the middle of the morning.

Migrants have stolen ranges from nearby firms. They will use them to build new huts or for the fire. Those companies' heads have lodged complaint against them. On the 21st of April, 150 migrants were arrested. They were released not long after.

The lack of sleep, food, hygiene, the French climate and the continuous fear of being arrested, have great consequences on their health. The day the picture was taken, it had been raining and the wind had been blowing all day long.

Inside a hut. The young child on the left is only ten years old. He has come from Afghanistan alone. He spent five months travelling. A group of migrants took him in at his arrival in Calais. They confided in me that the food given by the associations isn't enough due to their youth and extreme living conditions.

Because of the bad hygiene conditions, a number of them end up with scabies.

A twenty-one year old Afghan showing me a picture of him taken before his departure from his birth country. He used to be a well-groomed person. He doesn't like his actual state. I can barely recognize him from the picture. It was only taken six months ago.
